February Guest Speaker – Brad Cummings – Rocky Mountain Veterans Advocacy Project

The Rocky Mountain Veterans Advocacy Project (RMVAP) provides military and veteran legal advocacy services, pairing individual veterans and military servicemembers with licensed attorneys. These teams work primarily on VA disability benefit compensation cases at the regional level, Board of Veterans' Appeals (BVA), and Court of Appeals for Veterans Claims (CAVC), as well as discharge upgrade cases before the Boards of the Department of Defense. Our goal is to better help veterans and military servicemembers navigate the Veterans Affairs' system and the appeals process, and to assist prior servicemembers in obtaining the discharge status that they rightfully deserve.



Local veterans volunteer in CCSD schools as part of "all hands-on deck" approach!

As David Lyons was wiping down a table in the Cimarron Elementary School cafeteria in early February, a student approached and gazed at him with a broad smile.



“Did you know that you’re very tall?” the student asked Lyons, who’ll turn 74 in May.

Lyons responded with a grin and a good-natured acknowledgement before the student headed back to her lunch table. Lyons, an Aurora resident who’s been volunteering at the school for the past several weeks, has gotten accustomed to feedback from the students as he helps out with everyday tasks like wiping down tables, taking out the trash and keeping an eye on Cimarron’s students during the day. Lyons, who never had kids of his own, said the experience has been rewarding and humbling in too many ways to count.

“It’s been something, getting used to a whole bunch of kids running around,” he said. “Last week a little girl just came up and hugged my leg. This has been a wonderful experience.”

Lyons is no stranger to volunteering and to serving his community. A resident of the Pheasant Run Park neighborhood in Aurora, Lyons has volunteered at locales across his community in recent years. But his history of service goes much deeper. Lyons served in the U.S. Navy from 1967 to 1971; he was in active service during the Vietnam War, and that pattern of selflessness and dedication to a cause larger than himself has persisted over the decades.

When his chapter of the Vietnam Veterans of America put out the call for volunteers for the Cherry Creek School District during an especially challenging time, Lyons didn’t hesitate to sign up. CCSD has seen recent challenges in terms of staffing, as the Omicron variant of the COVID-19 pandemic has sapped schools across the district of staff, paraprofessionals, and teachers. Lyons is only one of many local veterans who’ve joined district administrators, office staff and other employees reporting to schools over recent weeks to offer support in an “all hands-on deck” approach to dealing with the situation.

Lyons, who's quick to point out that he regularly reaches out to see where he can help in the community, said that ethos is one he shares with his fellow servicemembers.

"I don't know too many veterans who, when called to do something, don't do it," he said. "I've volunteered all over the place; I make a point to reach out to see where I'm needed. All of the veterans I know would do the same thing."

Lyons, who served 19 months on a hospital ship and two years in Bermuda during the Vietnam War, faced plenty of challenges during his time in the military. Even though volunteering at Cimarron posed a much different set of demands, Lyons took to the work with enthusiasm and heart. It's all part of being invested in his community he said and helping out when the times got tough.

"I feel like I have a large connection with Cherry Creek Schools," Lyons said, as a group of students reporting for lunch filed into the cafeteria. "This is my way to help out when they need it."

Did you know of the short lived 49-star flag.?

Alaska's statehood on Jan 3, 1959, officially added a 49th star to the US flag on July 4 that year. The constellation would thus be arranged in seven rows of seven stars, but not for long. The Army Quartermaster Depot produced a 49-star flag to have on hand for the statehood signing ceremony, conducted by President Dwight Eisenhower, and the Annin Co. produced a 265-pound 49-star flag that month, as well, for use in the northernmost state.

Hawaii was granted statehood in August 1959, and 50-starflags were produced, but nearly an entire year passed., thanks to an 1818 law, before the 50th star became official July 4, 1960.




And only in our wildest dreams did we expect to see, a boy named George with Lipstick, in the Land That Made Me, Me

The little boy heard the doorbell ring, so he hurried to open the door and there stood Grandma's minister.


